Program Notes

Ancestral Rumors is a modern take on the classical 'Theme and Variations' style using an original theme and written for the Wind Ensemble. It consists of 19 variations and a coda modeled within a larger overall ABA form with an introduction, exposition, interlude with development, recapitulation, and coda. In a sense, it loosely resembles a hybrid between Theme and Variations and the Sonata Style, both of which were highly influential in the Classical Period. The use of an original theme with strong modal roots alongside a modernized tonal (and sometimes bitonal) harmony add a colorfully-spiced work to the wind repertory.

This work was commissioned by Derek Stoughton and the Southeastern Louisiana University Symphonic Band.

The music of Andrew Boss is widely acclaimed for expressing its creative voice, offering captivated listeners "something that has never been heard before." (Florida Music Teachers Association). His musical language is encapsulated in a "vividly spiced language" (Baltimore Sun). Residing in Fort Lauderdale, FL, Dr. Boss is currently completing several commissions and is teaching private music theory and composition. He also serves at his local church as a pianist, choral singer, and organist.

Dr. Boss has enjoyed many world premieres by the world's leading ensembles. The 2017 world premiere of his large-scale organ symphony, *In Adventu Finalem*, by the Dallas Winds under the baton of Jerry Junkin was a considerable success. Dr. Boss has also enjoyed a critically-acclaimed world premiere of his *Concerto for Alto Saxophone and Small Chamber Orchestra* (2015) by Baltimore-based chamber orchestra, *Symphony Number One*, and is considered as one of their founding composers.

Dr. Boss has been the recipient of many honors in his career as a composer, including the 2017 FSMTA Commissioned Composer Fund. He has been part of numerous special collaborations, including that for his work, *Until Morning Come*, dedicated to and premiered by the Marjorie Stoneman Douglas Wind Symphony on behalf of the shooting.
